Do You Have Your TollTag?



First time TollTag user? Get your TollTag at the Grand Prairie Tourist Center, 2170 N. Belt Line road, today! Just bring your drivers license, license plate number for all vehicles for which you would like to purchase a TollTag, and a debit or credit card. You will fill out an online form, pay with your credit card and receive your TollTag immediately! The Tourist Center is open Monday-Saturday 9 a.m.-5 pm. Cost is \$40 per TollTag and you may keep the money on your TollTag for many years or reload as needed. NTTA TollTags work on all Texas toll roads and at DFW Airport.

Toll rates for SH 161 through Grand Prairie are 15.3 cents per mile, while ZipCash customers pay 50 percent more. The cost difference is due to the higher costs of toll collection associated with ZipCash transactions.

CITY OFFERS FREE CLASS FOR INTERESTED FIRST-TIME HOMEBUYERS

Grand Prairie Housing and Neighborhood Services offers a free class each month to anyone who is interested in purchasing a home for the first time. The homebuyer education class, officially approved by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), provides potential homebuyers information about financial preparation, credit readiness and overall guidance through the home buying process.

Those who complete the class receive a Homebuyer Certificate, which helps qualify them for the city's various first-time homebuyer and down payment assistance programs.

PIPELINE SAFETY

Natural gas pipelines are safe, silent and unseen, but a leak or damage due to digging or a natural disaster poses a potential hazard.

How can I find buried natural gas and other utility lines before excavating on my property?

811 is the national "Call Before You Dig" number. Homeowners and professional excavators can call 811 and the call center will notify utilities in your area to come mark underground lines free of charge. Digging without calling can lead to harm to those who dig, costly damages to underground infrastructure and utility service disruptions.

What should I do if I suspect a gas leak?

- Leave the area immediately and tell others to leave too.
- Call Atmos Energy from a safe distance at our toll-free emergency number 1-866-322-8667 or call 911. A technician will investigate.
- Do not turn any lights on or off, smoke or use a cell phone, or operate any vehicle or equipment that could cause sparks.

HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION DAY DEC. 1, JAN. 5

Cooking oil and grease can clog drains when poured down the kitchen sink. This causes either your drain or the City's sanitary sewer to back up and overflow. Sewer overflows to the environment are harmful to wildlife and can cause fish kills. Grease blockages are the single greatest cause of sewer overflows in Grand Prairie. When the pipe is blocked, raw sewage comes up through cleanouts or city manholes, contaminating the soil and waterways.

Used grease and cooking oil should be poured into a non-leaking container and taken to a household hazardous waste (HHW) collection event for recycling. The next HHW event is scheduled for December 1 and January 5 at the Development Center (206 W. Church Street) from 9-11 a.m. **REGISTRATION IS REQUIRED.**

We will accept household and automotive batteries, pharmaceuticals, motor oil, cooking oil, paint, aerosol cans, fluorescent bulbs, and household, landscape, and pool chemicals. We will not accept explosives, gas cylinders, fireworks, medical waste, radioactive materials, or municipal trash. No commercial waste will be

FOOD SAFETY TIPS FOR HEALTHY HOLIDAYS

Parties, family dinners, and other gatherings where food is served are all part of the holiday cheer. But the merriment can change to misery if food makes you or others ill.

The good news is that practicing four basic food safety measures can help prevent foodborne illness.

Clean:

- Wash hands with warm water and soap for 20 seconds before handling any food.
- Wash food-contact surfaces with hot, soapy water after preparing each food item.
- Rinse fruits and vegetables thoroughly under cool running water.

Separate:

- Keep eggs and raw meats away from foods that won't be cooked.
- Use two cutting boards for foods that will be cooked and for those that will not.
- Keep fruits and vegetables that will be eaten raw separate from other foods.
- Do not put cooked foods on unwashed containers that held raw food items.

Cook:

- Food is safely cooked when it reaches the recommended internal temperature.
- Use a food thermometer to make sure that all your food items are safely cooked.
- Bring sauces, soups, and gravies to a rolling boil when reheating.

Chill:

- Refrigerate leftovers and takeout foods within two hours.
- Set your refrigerator at or below 40°F and the freezer at 0°F.
- Defrost foods in the refrigerator, under cold running water, or in the microwave.
- Leftovers should be used within three to four days.
